






AAUW ITHACA CO-SPONSORS PROGRAM WOMEN AS LEADERS: FOUR LOCAL ACTIVISTS

NEWS FROM BRANCH ACTION FUND CHAIR

Hope you had a wonderful holiday season. I want to express my sincere appreciation to you for your generous donations to AAUW Funds in 2018. During our annual fundraising effort, branch member donations were higher than 2017, with a total of \$2,266 donated. Members donated \$995 to Educational Opportunities Fund, \$695 to the Legal Advocacy Fund, and \$576 to the newly renamed AAUW Greatest Needs Fund (formerly known as the Action Fund). Thank you so much for your continued support of AAUW philanthropy.



LACK OF WOMEN LEADERS IN OUR NATION'S NON-PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS



AAUW published a research study in May 2018 looking at the lack of women leaders in our nation's non-profit organizations titled *Broken Ladders: Barriers to Women's Representation in Non-Profit Leadership*. In 2012, the non-profit sector accounted for \$1.4 trillion of the nation's economy and employed more than 11 million Americans, with 75% of these employees being women. There are approximately 96,000 non-profit organizations with annual budgets of at least \$250,000 in this country and women hold 56% of the chief executive positions. However, of the 2,200 non-profit organizations with budgets of at least \$50 million, women only hold 22% of the chief executive positions. Gender-based pay gaps range from 6% to 18% for women chief executive positions compared to male chief executives' compensation packages.

For charitable foundations, in 2015 women made up almost 90% of the lower level staff. Only 4 women were serving as chief executives in foundations with assets over \$1 billion and their boards are only 40% women. The research study highlighted the need for better data collection both by the Department of Labor and by privately conducted studies. The research also focuses on the need for passing equal pay laws, reducing gender discrimination, and for better paid family and medical leave benefits for women employed by non-profits. Addressing the lack of women leadership in non-profits will require focusing on multiple approaches that require long-term commitments to cultural change.

Your continued support of AAUW Funds will further women's access to leadership roles and pay equity in both non-profits and corporations.
