With some 40 members, we are "small but mighty" as Margaret Nichols, our longest serving president, likes to describe us.

We won a platinum award for programming for our Centennial events. We were among the top five branches for contributions to the Educational Opportunities Fund. *Ithaca Insights* was named a Newsletter of Excellence and our website was name a Website of Merit. Congratulations to all!

Alene notes, "I was struck both by how many branches have dissolved and by the energy of some of the ones that are thriving. Some of this comes from women of color in leadership roles. I heard two branches talk about how the social activities are what attract people initially —book groups, bridge, mah jongg, and book sales. Most memorable were the personal stories — the LAF recipient and the child sexual abuse survivor and her campaign to change the law."


## Come to Cazenovia July 19-21





#### WOMEN IN SPORTS – WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?

AAUW has had a long history of advocacy and research focusing on enforcement of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972. AAUW's Legal Advocacy Fund has supported many cases involving Title IX discrimination

Current AAUW research indicates that Title IX enforcement still has a long way to go. Girls have 1.2 million fewer chances to play sports in high school than boys. Less than two-thirds of African American and Hispanic girls play sports. More than three-quarters of white girls do.



Katie Scanlon, Syracuse University Director of Student-Athlete Development and Ph.D. candidate, lead a discussion of these issues at the New York State AAUW Convention in Cooperstown. Katie works with both the women's lacrosse and men's basketball teams. She is responsible for developing, implementing and evaluating academic support plans, monitoring tutoring, coordinating with campus advisors and faculty, and assisting with career development plans. She also works with Syracuse University's Registrar to ensure NCAA Certifications for Compliance.

Under the leadership of Education Secretary Betsy DeVos, efforts are being made to dismantle Title IX or weaken its protections. Your continued support of AAUW's research and public policy work is critical today to ensure that all women and girls have an equal chance to participate in educational opportunities, including sports.
