## Member News: Leslie Danks Burke Is Running for State Senate

Leslie is running for the New York State Senate against Republican Tom O'Mara in the 58th senate district, which includes Ithaca, Hornell, Bath, Penn Yan, Corning, Elmira, and Watkins Glen. Unfortunately, Tompkins County has been gerrymandered among three senate districts, so not all of us can vote in her race. AAUW is non-partisan, but each of us as individuals can support candidates.

Here's what Leslie told the *Ithaca Times* about her reasons for running: "It's the same thing that's changed for all of us," she said. "As Americans, we have really recognized over the last three or four years that our country needs us. This democratic republic only functions if we are participating. [...] After 2015-2016, I realized that I wanted to put my career as a lawyer on hold to spend as much time as I could doing what I could to help improve our region and our country. 

### WE CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Jeanette Knapp has asked me to serve as your Policy Chair which I do appreciate very much. She has included a short vita for me so you know I have 25 years policy experience in Washington, D.C., and some 3 years here in Ithaca working for Connie Cook.

To me, the most important thing about policy is representing the views of the people who belong to the group one is working for. National AAUW has chosen 4 categories of issues to engage in: Civil Rights, Education, Economic Security and Title IX issues. This may seem overly general and dull until you realize that

- Civil Rights means things like removing the deadline for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment, Right to Vote, etc.
- Education Issues means state funding for community and state colleges; reducing student debt, STEM.
- Economic Security Issues include Health Care, Paycheck Fairness Act, Paid Sick & Caregiving Leave, banning mandatory arbitration & nondisclosure agreements.
- Title IX means reduce sexual harassment and violence in schools, expand loan forgiveness programs, cover tuition and non-tuition costs, create access to child care so parents can stay in school.

There are many more. However, if you work together with a group of folks around a common cause, you can make a difference. We can make a difference. Let me know what issues you are interested in. We can research them for more information for and against and develop plans to make the appropriate government and public agencies know how we feel. I look forward to hearing from you. Two new members joined at the Wine and Food Pairing Fundraiser. They are Carolyn David and Marilyn Migiel.


Carolyn likes Mah Jongg and classical music. She is passionate about Mah Jongg and likes to share her knowledge and love of the game with others.
