#### Vote on Membership Requirement

Have you invited a friend to join AAUW only to realize she was not a college graduate? You can vote yes or no on changing this requirement beginning April 7 at AAUW.org. Details are at AAUW Election: Prep Your Vote, but briefly, it involves equity and inclusion. The Association's board explains it this way: "AAUW's mission is to advance gender equity, yet the requirement for membership explicitly denies access to membership to those without college degrees. AAUW does not promote equity for all women and girls if the organization maintains exclusionary membership requirements. . . . By eliminating this requirement, AAUW can become a more diverse and inclusive organization, better aligned with the needs of women today."




The President and Recorder positions are 2 year terms. The Program V.P. is a 1 year term. The election of our new officers will be held at our annual meeting in May.

## AAUW FUNDS NEWS

In late February, *AAUW*, *Women's Power Gap Initiative* at the *Eos Foundation*, and *The Wage Project* released their collaborative research report *"The Power Gap Among Top Earners At America's Elite Universities 20 21 Report"* (aauw.org/resources/research/power-gap-top-earners-elite-universities/).

131 private and public high research activity or R1 institutions were asked to provide employee compensation, gender, racial and ethnic data. Only 48 universities (37%) provided full reports compared with 12 universities (9%) providing partial data and 70 (54%) declining to provide

and verify data. The report identified 4 key findings regarding the status of top earners at the universities despite women earning 54% of the PhD degrees and 60% of the master's degrees.

**Key Finding #1:** Less than a quarter of all of the top earners are women and women's representation varies greatly by category.

Key Finding #2: Women of color are virtually nonexistent among top earners.

Key Finding #3: Faculty and deans in traditionally male-dominated disciplines score the highest pay.

Key Finding #4: Lack of data transparency impedes accountability and progress.

The authors conclude that making more data publicly available on the gender, race, and compensation of R1 institutions administrative and faculty is one way to achieving equity through accountability and transparency. Each institution should conduct their own equity audits and eliminate any bias in the recruitment of new faculty and administrators.

## **PUBLIC POLICY NEWS**

The Board met on March 1<sup>st</sup> via Zoom to discuss AAUW- Ithaca's future. We decided to send a letter to the new Secretary of Education, Dr. Miguel Cardona, about the same issues Jeanette sent in a letter to President Biden: extending the pause on federal and private student loan repayment. We added: to extend the pause long enough to have those holding the loans to have time to get a job after the corona virus economic downturn ends. We also said we fully support reducing student loans by \$10,000. We explained who the AAUW is and how much the student loan problem affects women.

A discussion among the Board called for us to support subsidies for child care so women can keep their jobs, increasing the size of SNAP to help with food insecurity, increasing the minimum wage and supporting help for schools and colleges trying to adjust for Covid safety and to improve the quality of the education offered including teacher pay.

Are we interested in making our voices heard on climate change, energy, and so on?

Are you prepared to vote on the AAUW membership requirement to have a higher education degree? I was told last night the national office has wanted to eliminate that requirement for multiple years. If that happens, they want to hire a public relations firm to come up with a new name for the organization. Interesting! As you know, there is a state wide discussion of this over zoom.

As always, I welcome your thoughts on this and other issues – send ideas to <u>madeleine.hemmings</u> <u>@gmail.com</u> - anytime. I received my first corona virus shot this morning – amazing to see how well Cayuga Medical Center has organized the former Sears location for this enterprise. I hope you all are on your way to get these shots.
