Book Group Meets Monday Evening, March 14

Explore the Secret History of Home Economics

I know. We all have our stories about junior high or high school home economics classes. But after reading this book, I realized that I learned a lot from Miss Kissinger. And my college friends who majored in home ec may well have been better prepared for their futures than the History of the Civil War prepared me for mine.

Celebrate Women's History Month this Monday evening, March 14, by discussing *The Secret History of Home Economics* by Danielle Dreilinger. Among the featured players in this fascinating social history are Ellen Swallow Richards, the co-founder of AAUW, and Martha Van Rensselaer, one of the founders of Cornell University's College of Human Ecology.

AAUW was founded because graduates of the new women's colleges were largely shut out of the professions their degrees should have opened doors to. The home economics profession was begun by women scientists who understood how valuable what they were learning could be to everyday living. Women excluded from most science and engineering jobs found a way out of no way. Ellen Richards was a chemist who helped create Boston's first sewage system.

Please join us even if you have not finished the book. I (Jeanette) will be leading the discussion and look forward to your insights on the value and future of home economics. AAUW RESEARCH



AAUW funded research lead by Irasema Garzam, J.D. into the devastating economic and health impact that the COVID-19 Pandemic has had on Latina Women and their families. The research included numerous interviews with women whom have faced large consequences as a result of the pandemic which only worsen their economic security and both mental and physical health. Unfortunately, Latinas as a community have compromised the highest levels of infections and deaths from COVID-19. Latina Women represent 18% of the US women population, yet, they are over-represented in low wage essential frontline occupations, and earn 55 cents for every dollar a white non-Hispanic man earns. The research recommends that Congress increase minimum wage for frontline essential workers, ensure gender pay equity, expand health care insurance coverage, and expand coverage for unemployment insurance benefits. Many of the interviewed Latina Women for this research were undocumented excluding them from the CARES Act of 2020 and they were not eligible for unemployment benefits. Many Latina Women do not have access to educational resources that would allow them to gain better employment opportunities and economic security. The research recommends that Congress address college affordability by increasing funding for need-based aid and addressing student debt.

The interviews also highlighted the extreme choices that many Latina Women faced over going to work vs. staying home with their children and other domestic responsibilities during the initial months of the pandemic. The research recommends that Congress address the need for more affordable, quality, and available child care facilities across the country. Also, the need to address the lack of paid time-off through earned sick time and paid family and medical leave have been further identified for many Latina Women as

critical challenges that they are facing throughout their lives.
