Board Embraces AAUW Ithaca Branch Scholarship

At the April Board meeting, branch leaders voted unanimously to continue to raise funds for the AAUW Ithaca Branch Scholarship at Tompkins Cortland Community College. The endowed scholarship was established by Sarah Johnson, a longtime branch member, to be awarded to a woman with financial need who was returning to school at TC3.

Sarah attended a community college and returned to college later in life. She endowed the scholarship to honor both the branch and TC3's significant contribution to the three Transition conferences that the Ithaca Branch held (2002-2004). These day-long meetings brought women who wanted more education together with educators and peers who could help them figure out how to do this.

The board was grateful for Sarah's gift and voted to continue to raise funds for the scholarship through donations or other fund-raising activities. The scholarship is a visible demonstration of how the branch supports education for women locally. Look for a letter this fall requesting support for the scholarship and other AAUW priorities. As part of the branch's centennial celebration in 2018. the branch invited members and former members to make a centennial gift to the AAUW Ithaca Branch scholarship at TC3. These gifts and the growth of the endowment increased the fund enough that the first scholarship was awarded in the fall of 2019. The scholarship has been awarded each fall since.

An Endowed Scholarship Is Permanent

Some branch scholarships are not endowed. All of the money raised each year goes to the scholarship recipient. If the branch does not raise money the next year or disbands, the scholarship disappears.

Because Ithaca's scholarship is a permanently established endowed scholarship, it will be awarded each year whether or not the branch continues to raise funds for the scholarship. Only the interest, not the principle of the fund is awarded. If the branch continues to add to the fund, annual awards should increase well ahead of the inflation rate and well ahead of the money we may or may not be able to raise each year.

A scholarship that was established by one of our members and subsequently supported by many others is now in both name and fact the AAUW Ithaca Branch Scholarship.
