She stated the following: "I am going to be a Chemical Dependency Counselor. When I graduate from Tompkins-Cortland, I plan on transferring to either SUNY Brockport or Syracuse University where I can finish getting my bachelor's degree in addiction counseling as well as minoring in criminal justice. I want to start and run my own program in my county to try and help people get into recovery. I want to try and help bring change to my community."

We are also fortunate to have Neha Garg, a recipient of the AAUW Selected Professions Fellowship, studying at Cornell University. Neha Garg is a graduate student in Cornell's Architecture and Design Program. # From the Editor Why I Joined AAUW

I have been a member of AAUW and the Ithaca Branch for some 40 years, thanks to my friend and longtime member, Kathryn Torgeson. We were grading student papers, sharing an office in the basement of the old Roberts Hall at Cornell. She said there was this great group of really interesting women, and I should join. By then I was past La Leche League and ready for more than Girl Scouts, so I did join. And she was right. Jennie Farley, the first head of Women's Studies at Cornell, was president and the branch was supporting the Cornell 11, eleven women who were professors and coaches, suing Cornell University for equal pay and promotion.

Kathryn was a chemist and professional indexer of scientific books and, for many years, the editor of the branch's monthly newsletter. Our branch has been blessed with many talented newsletter editors, and I have occasionally substituted for them, but this is my first time as editor. As I pulled this issue together, I thought fondly of my diligent and creative predecessors, Kathryn Torgeson, Alene Wyatt, Peggy Miller, Pat Sims, Sharon Barrie, Kim Edgar and others and hope to do as well. Kathryn died last fall on November 19, 2021 at age 95. *Hail and farewell*.
