On Wednesday, March 29, at 7:00 p.m., via Zoom, Lin Tollefsen will explore the details of Cornell's land grant. The Morrill Act of 1862 made it possible for states to establish new colleges and universities that emphasized agriculture and mechanic arts. These land grant institutions opened higher education opportunities to farmers and working people, but deprived Native communities of millions of acres of their homelands.


Enjoy the extra daylight hours in the evenings that Spring provides us!

# **Meet the Chilbury Ladies Choir**

Join us, via Zoom, Monday evening, April 10 (Easter Monday) to discuss Jennifer Ryan's look at women in an English village carrying on during the early days of World War II. If you have ever sung in a choir, this book may remind you of why you came to choir practice every week.



One reviewer describes *The Chilbury Ladies Choir* this way: "What makes the book especially endearing are the frequent passages that point out the pleasing effects of singing in a choir. As Mrs. Tilling states 'Funny how a bit of singing brings us together. There we were in our own little worlds, with our own problems, and then suddenly they seemed to dissolve, and we realized that it's us here now, living

through this, supporting each other. That's what counts."

#### **Charming and Entertaining**

The reviewer continues, "Although the war is a backdrop for the novel and genuine drama takes place, *The Chilbury Ladies' Choir* is not exactly serious historical fiction. It contains some sobering segments, but is really a charming and entertaining read."

## Family Program at the Johnson Museum

Bobbie Kohut sent this report from the program our branch helped sponsor on a snowy Saturday: There were about 40 people attending—plenty of children and parents. Perry Ground, a cultural educator and traditional storyteller from the Turtle Clan of the Onondaga Nation, was captivating. He was dressed in his native clothing about which he explained the particular materials and definitely the two eagle feathers in his "hat." The feathers, he said, he was allowed to place in a specific way because of his mother's clan of the Onondaga. He had everyone's complete attention. He was serious in the history of the stories and at times quite funny. He told four different stories and engaged children to be his "helpers" in telling a story. When he asked questions, several children answered with detailed, correct facts (very impressive). It was a fun, informative program, and the children stayed interested all that time! I was very glad I attended.

# Remembering Jeanne & Grace

We lost two of our own this winter. Jeanne Peck died on March 6. Jeanne was a longtime member, fond of books and reading. The Book Group enjoyed meeting at her historic farmhouse in Brooktondale. In addition to insightful discussions, we were fascinated by Jeanne's many antiques and collections. I remember especially the beautiful dolls. For more than 30 years, Jeanne volunteered at the Friends of the Library Book Sale. She was the Book Sale Coordinator in 2001-2002. As Membership VP, I was thrilled to discover she was a national member of AAUW who was happy to join our branch. She was a precise and organized treasurer. For more than 40 years, Grace worked with faculty, students, Peace Corps volunteers and international students and scholars at the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at Cornell. She invited many remarkable women from abroad to our annual Fellowship Dinner for international women graduate students. In 2009 she moved to Lexington, Kentucky, to be near one of her daughters and grandchildren.
