Scott D. Doyle, Ithaca College's Director of Energy Management & Sustainability, will offer some insights into how IC is working to reduce its carbon emissions through cost-effective projects with the IC campus community. The challenge is to balance this reduction with equally important priorities related to enrollment, educational focus, deferred maintenance, and energy and sustainability. - We are inspired by memories of her energy and generosity.
- She was President of our Branch from 1982 to 1984.
- She was our webmaster, using her technical skills to

keep our members informed of our activities and the public informed of the important work of AAUW.

- She created our Directory each year and our GoogleGroup.
- She was an active member of the Board, the Book Group and the Theater Group.

In addition to her contributions to AAUW, Alene was a member of the boards of The League of Women Voters, The City Federation of Women's Organizations, The Human Services Coalition, The Health Planning Council, and The Social Services League. She also volunteered as a poll site manager and sorted books for the Friend of the Library book sale.

Early in her career she helped create a resource center for childcare providers at the Day Care & Child Development Council (The Gathering Place) which led to her career in early childhood education, ultimately as Day Care Developer at the Council.

When she moved to Kendal in 2006, she used her technical know-how to run their television station. She said, "Who ever imagined I would grow up to be a television producer!" But her contributions to her community extended far beyond her technical skill.

Alene's contributions to our Branch were beyond measure. In April of this year she shared photos and told the story of her generous, rich life at our monthly Branch program. 

## Save Freedom to Read

Banned Books Week was this past week, October 5-11. The theme was "Censorship Is So 1984. Read for Your Rights." The week concluded with *Let Freedom Read Day* on October 11. Banned Books Week reminds us how important libraries are in protecting intellectual freedom and our democracy, plus in providing access to a diversity of voices. A disproportionate number of book challenges continue to target works by Black, Indigenous, People of Color, and LGBTQIA+ authors, as well as their communities. Note that there is intersectionality across these identities.

According to the American Library Association, All Boys Aren't Blue by George M. Martin was the most frequently challenged book in 2024. Meanwhile, PEN America reports that the most challenged book in the 2024-2025 school year was A Clockwork Orange by Antony Burgess. In an interview with Newsweek, Stephen King said that he is the most banned author.

PEN America's <u>website</u> indicates that they have "documented nearly 23,000 book bans in public schools nationwide since 2021, a number never before seen in the life of any living American." Wow. On Thursday, ABC News <u>mentioned PEN America's new report on the normalization of book banning</u> across the country--and interviewed George M. Martin.

Why mention a week that has already happened? The fight for the freedom to read continues on. Please urge Governor Hochul to sign the Freedom to Read Act without delay (she has until December). Here is the contact form; or, call her office at 1-518-474-8390.
